



Sorry I missed writing an article last month. I have some interesting items from the AMA. First of all, I will quote from the Executive Council meeting of January 29, 1983, held in Anaheim, California, item #8 dealing with the Omahawks noise pollution suit. "Mr. O.L. Olson appeared before the council to explain the suit filed against their club for noise pollution. Olson stated that if the opposition wins the case against them it will set a legal precedent extremely detrimental to the modeling hobby. The Omahawks are seeking official AMA support by council resolution and editorial comments in Model Aviation. They are also asking that the Academy establish and administrate a "Natioal Legal Defense Fund" to assist clubs in similar situations in the future. It was pointed out in discussion that if the Omahawks had been chartered with AMA their legal fees would have been covered by the Academy's The council was sympathetic to their plight, but felt that they insurance. could only support the cause as individuals, and not as collective official council action, due to the fact the Omahawks have not been and are not now chartered with AMA. Mr. Olson was asked to keep the council apprised of the situation as it develops. In the meantime it was MOVED by D. Brown, seconded by T. McGinnis that the council go on record as giving total moral support to the Omahawks. And due to the possible legal precedence that they be given additional support as recommended by our insurance company and legal The motion passed: 12 for, 1 against." counsel.

At the last Association meeting there was a discussion about this subject and a copy of a flyer from the Omahawks requesting financial aid was circulated. The AMA's position is quite clear in that the Omahawks were not, and as of the meeting had still not elected to become chartered with the AMA. I leave it to you and your clubs to decide how to handle your letter.

There are other interesting topics in the copies of executive council meetings that I have received from the AMA. Upon request I will supply your club a copy of these minutes for your perusal.

I've just received a letter from Carl Maroney, Special Services Director, which outlines a very attractive homeowners package offered by Alexander and Alexander, which provides up to \$5,000 of "all-risk" insurance coverage. This coverage applies to your models and equipment, if you should elect to transfer your homeowners to Alexander and Alexander (at the same price you are presently paying). Watch Model Aviation for more details. Sounds like a great deal to me.

A GHOST FROM THE PAST

The B-29 Superfortress looked ready for a Wartime Bombing Mission. Her four 2,200 hp, Wright Cyclone engines were ready to roar to life. The gun turrets pointed to the sky over the Syracuse Airfield.

That's how she looked as we, Bill Brooks & I walked towards her Wednesday night May 18th. She belongs to the Confederate Air Force & was on tour of major cities & towns across the country. She flew from home base Harlingen, Texas.

"Fifi" is the only flying b-29 bomber left of nearly 4,000 produced. It's a big aircraft even by todays standards. Wing span 141', length 99'. The tail stands 29' high. She had a range of 3,700 miles & carried 6,900 gal. of gas. Service ceiling 33,00', 325 mph, T.A.S.

As we climbed the steps to view the cockpit, Bill began to talk about the B-29. He was a gunner & flew with the 19th Bomb Group, 20th Air Force, in the Pacific. He flew from airfields on Guam, Tinian, & Saipan. As we looked down through the clear nose turret, where the bombadier sat over the Norden bomb sight, you could almost imagine the targets, far away sounding names, Yokahama, Kobe, & Tokio, & the long hours the crew flew together to the target & hopefully back.

Back down on the ground we talked to a crew member of a B-29, who flew in the Korean conflict. The B-29 flew from June 1944 (World War II) to Korea. An impressive record.


The B-29 was the 1st production aircraft with pressurized interior. This technology is still used in todays airliners. "Fifi" is not an original aircraft. She was put together from various B-29's lying in the desert, & flown to Harlingen, Texas in 1971.

It cost us \$2 to view & enjoy "Fifi", plus we received a C.A.F. Button & information brochure. "That's where I got all these Spec's." Some specifications are Air Force, others are "Fifi's".

"Fifi" is not subsidized by any agency, or foundation. The sale of hat's, tshirts, buttons, & picture prints help to defray costs. If "Fifi" returns to Syracuse, go out & see her. I"m sure you won't be disappointed, & you will witness an important part of Aviation History.

At 7:50 PM, the C.N.Y.M.A.A. meeting was called to order by President Lon Sauter.

Roll call was taken and most clubs were represented.

Old Business

Minutes of last meeting (April 21) were read and approved.

Treasurer's report read with almost no changes since last meeting.

<u>NATS</u> - Club reps reported almost no interest in members taking a chartered bus to Westover, Mass. for the NATS. One more attempt will be made to stir up interest before dropping the matter. Bob Elkovich contacted several bus companies to obtain cost of bus for the trip, and found the Onondaga Coach to be lowest. A 47 seater for one day @ \$800.00 or two days @ \$950.00.

Mr. King Simkins addressed the Association in regard to a static show and flying demonstration at Onondaga Community College, Sunday, September 25, 1983 from 10:00 A.M. to 3:00 P.M. Any monies made from this festival will be given to the Ray Cushman Scholarship Fund. A prize will be given for the overall best-of-show. Flying time will be about 15 minutes each hour.

Roy Catholdi made the motion we accept the invitation. Seconded by Ron Leopardi and past unanimously.

Representatives to contact their clubs and recruit participants.

Lon Sauter reported that he now has all the questionnaires returned that he sent to each club president.

Lon reported that he met with the Utica M.V.R.C.C., and they wish to remain active members of the CNYMAA. They will send reps to four meetings per year. Welcome back Guys & Gals.

A question has risen from our ranks as to whether the CNYMA Association has the authority to spend in excess of two hundred (\$200.00) dollars without club members approval. Club reps feel that the association does have this authority <u>PROVIDED</u> that it is for normal association business. (Symposium expenses, stationery, etc.). However, club members would control expenditures in this price range were it for non-operating expenses such as campaign funds, scholarships, equipment, etc. If an emergency precludes obtaining club's vote, the association will exercise its own judgement. Proposal made by Bill Cummings and seconded by Roy Catholdi. Fast unanimously. Lon Sauter, wearing his Electronics expert hat, reported on the state of the Associations four (4) digital stop watches. Three are functional and one has no digital display. A considerable amount of discussion ensued and due to the heavy demands for these watches, it was proposed by Bill Cummings and seconded by Ron Leopaldi that we purchase four (4) new watches \emptyset about fourteen dollars (\$14) each. Fast unanimously.

A flyer received from the above club indicated it was being sued for \$50,000 due to excessive noise caused by their aircraft engines. They are asking for contributions to help fight the case. The A.M.A. has helped them to the apparent limit of their jurisdiction. Discussion ensued and no action was taken.

Walt Throne reported that as of April 26, 1983, F.C.C. license <u>NOT</u> required to operate R.C. model airplanes.

A suggestion was made that the association sponsor someone to videotape the NATS. Association to provide equipment and tapes if some qualified person willing to do so. Pit passes also furnished.

Next meeting June 16, 1983 at 7:30 P.M. at STARS Field.


