#### SHIP SHAPE YOUR SHIPS FOR 1984

Now that fall has hit the great North East, and winter is on it's way, it's time to get out that new kit you've been itching to build. Right? Wrong! Forget that new kit. You've got more important work to do! At the end of the summer flying season, many weeks ago, you guys hung your models up with the thought of lots of sunny fall flying weather. I know I did; but, that's not how it turned out. So there your poor models hang after a hard summer of smashing and crashing, dripping oil on the floor anad unprepared for their winter hibernation. Now is the time, fellows, to get those models shipshape and all set for the 1984 flying season. The choice is up to you. Spend a few evenings in your comfortable work shop now, when the weather outside is yuckie, or spend the time frantically making repairs because your clunker won't depart terra firma, while your buddies are all enjoying a warm spring afternoon flying session.

OK, now that I've convinced you, let's get started on that oily mess. First of all, let's take everything apart. That includes the engine, fuel tank, radio, landing gear, wheels and anything else that can be removed for cleaning and inspection. Clean the surface of the model with a mild dish washing detergent to remove all of the oily film. After it is thoroughly dry, examine it outside and inside as much as you can, for any needed repairs. Also, inspect the pushrods, control linkages, clevises, horns and hinges. Replace anything that is worn or might fail. Any oil soaking can be partially removed with several applications of a material call Fullers Earth. It is generally available at drug stores. Now that the plane itself is back in good order, minus all of its 1983 dings and dents, let's not forget the engine and the rest of the stuff we removed.

First put a newspaper down on your work bench; plunk that hunk of screamin' aluminum on it. If you use castor oiled fuel (and you should be), you probably have a little, maybe a lot, of varnish on the head. The easiest and quickest way to remove it is with a paint and varnish removing solution available at any paint or hardware store. Pull the engine completely apart and wipe off any excess oil. Now coat the varnished areas with the paint remover and let them sit 10 or 15 minutes. Take an old toothbrush, scrub the parts, and rinse with clear water. If any varnish remains, dry and recoat with remover a second time. Dry the parts with a hair dryer or in the oven. Reassemble with a light gun oil, such as Hoppes'. For long term storage, a year or more, don't even think of putting that faithful machine away without a thorough devarnishing inside and out. Without proper cleaning and oiling, it will turn into a gummed-up mess that will be impossible to turn over, and difficult to disassemble. Next, let's look at the fuel tank. If you use the common Sullivan type, and it's more than 2 or 3 years old, it's probably ready for a new stopper and lines. Degrease the inside of the tank with denatured alcohol and let dry. Check the brass tubing for splits or rough edges and replace if necessary. Reassemble the tank with new fuel lines and stopper, and replace it in the model.

Lastly, but not leastly, let's look at that electronic wizardry that you steer your bomb around the sky with. Charge up the battery packs and check the system for obvious problems, like transmitters that won't transmit, receivers that won't receive and servos that won't serve. If everything works fine, so much the better; but we're not done yet. So, let's talk regular maintenance. For servos, pots should be cleaned and lubed regularly, gears inspected for wear, and motors for poor performance. Battery packs should be cycled to determine condition and reliability. Check wires for kinks or bumps in the insulation, which could indicate a broken conductor underneath. Use a magnifying glass to look for ends that could become unsoldered or appear weak, particularly around connectors. Now, how about your transmitter? Does it still have last Augusts oily fingerprints all over it? A little spray cleaner, like 409 or Windex, will shine it up line new. It's antenna - Ever clean it? Take a white paper towel and wipe it off. Pretty dirty, right? Remember, your antenna is a conductor; the dirt is not! Some of this maintenance you can do yourself, depending on how much you know about your radio equipment. Some, like tuning the transmitter and the receiver will probably have to be left to someone with the right testing equipment, such as the manufacturer.

Remember, model maintenance is necessary! OK, now you can get that kit out and start hacking out your winter project.
