





Minutes of 1-20-90 meeting.

Names of those receiving scholarships were given. Old Business: Lon mentioned that our future meetings will be held at the Schroeppel Town Hall on Route 57A on the second Wednesday of each month at

7pm. At our November meeting Lisle made a motion, and seconded by Snow Al Mortensen, that if a member attends eight or more meetings during the calendar year, he be given a ten reduction in the dollar following year's dues. Our club booth requirements at Symposium were discussed & decisions made. <u>New Business:</u> It was decided, by a suggestion by Dan Williams, that pylon racing rules & dates be made by a committee of three. Doug Harrington, Phil Morgan, & Lon Sauter have volunteered to comprise this committee. A contest director will be decided upon at a later date. It was also suggested that some pylon races to be conducted flying only the Sig Super Sport with a K&B 20 engine. Lon suggested that we have a training on certain dates program for new flyers. More on this later. Motion was made and seconded for adjournment at 9:38pm.



The U.S. Air Force Museum by Gary Brown

On a recent trip to Dayton, Ohio, we had the opportunity to pay a visit to the Air Force Museum. It's located adjacent to Wright Patterson Field, just a few minutes northeast of downtown Dayton.

As you approach the museum, parked outside are a number of early generation rockets and missles. Among them are two B-29's, a B-1, and a Lockheed Constellation, one of the most gracefully designed post-war piston driven transport aircraft.

The museum itself consists of two large hangar type buildings connected together, which house the main collection of aircraft and displays. Upon entering there is a bookstore and gift shop. The book store is filled with many excellent volumes, covering a wide range of aviation subjects. One could easily spend an hour studying the many titles.

The beginning of the museum deals with early aviation and proceeds chronilogically through aviation history, ending with displays of artifacts from early space flights. World War I aircraft were represented by a French Spad, an American Thomas Morse Scout, and a British Sopwith Camel and De Haviland DH-4, as well as several others. There were also a number of aircraft from the period between the wars. These included a Curtiss P6E Hawk, a Martin B-10,

and a Boeing pursuit biplane. World War II aircraft were probably the most numerous. They included a B-29, B-17, B-25, B-26, P-61 Blackwidow and many others, fighters as well as bombers. Also included in the collection were several German and Japanese fighters. Among them, a Focke Wulf FW-190, BF109 and a Kawanishi NIK2J "George". There were also a number of jet aircraft from the 50's and 60's, including a Soviet Mig-15 and a fully equipped F-86 with its right side fuselage skin removed to show the general arrangement of the aircrafts internal equipment. By far the most impressive aircraft in the museum is the behemoth B-36. A B-17 is dwarfed by this giant. Looking up into its bomb bay is akin to standing inside a barn! While the aircraft are the biggest attraction, the displays of memorabilia, artifacts, associated aircraft such as armaments and engines, and historical articles are no less fascinating to study. If your travels should take you into the vicinity of Dayton, Ohio, by all means allow a couple of hours to tour the Air Force Museum; it's well worth the time. The following is a proposed program to train new pilots and perpetuate the training process. It has been my observation that one of the most frustrating parts of entering this hobby is the fact that it is very difficult to find someone to teach you to fly the model after you've built it. Those interested in participating in this program, either as instructors or students, please contact me by stopping in the shop or calling me at 695-2448. Instructors will be awarded an AMA instructor patch upon their first students successful completion of a flight test. Lon Sauter

1990 STARS Flight Training Program

* Every Wednesday evening 6:30pm from June 1 to August 30 (STARS field)

* At least four instructors per session

* All new modelers welcome, after six lessons non members will be asked to join STARS if openings are available

* Each student will keep a log book (provided by STARS) to insure training continuity with instructor changes

* Primary purpose to train pilots to take-off and land safely. Also to recruit new STARS club members.

* There will be a graduation get together at the end of the flight training for graduates and instructors. Graduate will receive pilot wings.

* Each graduate will be requested to train another beginner to perpetuate the student training process. He will then be awarded an AMA instructor patch.

STARS Flight Training Curriculum

1. Introduction to flight controls, inspect model for air worthiness, pre and post flight check out.

 First flights concentrate on turns, level flight and keeping plane in front of student. Student is to fly as much as possible.

3. Practice slow flight, start flying approaches, recovery from unsual attitudes (stalls, diving turns, etc.).

Work on take-offs and continue 1 through 3.

5. Basic maneuvers to build confidence and continue 1 through 4. 6. Concentrate on final approach techniques and landings. Do repeated approaches to have student gain confidence.

7. Final flight test to consist of: Take-off, a series of simple maneuvers, a touch and go, and landing. Examiner to be an instructor other than students primary instructor.
