11 members, 1 Associate member & 1 Jr. member present. Meeting was called to order by President Dan Williams at 7:06PM. Minutes of previous meeting were approved. Treasurers report was given by Mike Graham & approved. We welcomed & voted in new Associate member Jeff Ogden.

<u>Association Report:</u> Phil Morgan mentioned that Association picnic will be held at our field on Sept. 30th. He also mentioned that constitution should be revised.

Field Report: Lon mentioned that the Yanmar tractor should be operated so grass is thrown outward toward outside of field (clockwise) to prevent grass buildup underneath mower which can result in belt breakage. Belts cost us \$30 each. We should also run it full throttle with both gear shift levers in the #2 position. You should start from the outside of field & spiral inward toward center. We discussed buying a sweeper or vac for field. This was dropped-considered too expensive. Lisle put two signs on entrance cable as mentioned in last minutes. Glenn Cady provided a detailed cost estimate from Chase-Pitkin for a 180 ft. chain link fence at \$474.23. Dave Sikorski provided us with a cost estimate from Atlas at a higher cost. Don Utz made a motion we proceed immediately on fence. This was seconded by Phil Morgan. Eight were for it, 3 against. Motion carried. Lon Sauter made motion we fence from Chase Pitkin. buv Seconded by Lisle Snow. Carried unanimously. Field committee will lay out various arrangements for final approval. Installation by us. New stone for driveway was shelved until after Air Show. Due to his excellent labors in the past, we have asked Glenn Cady to serve as a member of the field committee. Air Show work assignments were made

up for club members. Dan Williams

made a list of various entertainment activities & events at Air Show. He will contact individuals regarding this. Motion was made & seconded for adjournment at 9:00PM.

#### 1990 STARS SPORT PYLON RACING RULES

The purpose of this event is to promote fair competition, on a level that is readily attainable by the average sport flyer. All rule interpretations will be handled by the contest director, the primary intention being to keep the competition SAFE, simple, fair, and enjoyable.

The basic rules shall be in accordance with the AMA rules outlined in the section entitled SPORT PYLON (supplemental) class 1 and class 3, except for the following exceptions. Class 1 Rules will be used for all aircraft up to and including .40 cubic inch engines and 500 sq. inch wing. 40 engines must be non-schneurle. Class 3 Rules will be used for .40 schneurle powered aircraft and will be flown as a separate class. Tapered wings will be allowed in both classes for 500 sq inch wings; however, the airfoil must be a minimum of 12% section throughout the entire span of the wing. Any commercial muffler may be used, but no mini pipes or tuned pipes. The R/C Sport Pylon rules are on page 80 of the 1990/1991 AMA rule book. All racing will be done on a full dimension formula 1 pylon course. In addition for the 1990 season, there will be an event for only Sig Super Sport airplanes using a K&B .20 Sportster engine with either a 8 X 6 or 9 X 4 unmodified commercially available propeller. No modification to either the plane or the engine is permitted.

The racing dates for 1990 will be announced in the calendar of events in the Plane Prop Wash (the STARS official newsletter). All racing sessions will be held at the STARS field on County Route 12. Refreshments will be available at all sessions if possible.

#### FIELD ROLES

1. All host club field rules apply. All AMA safety rules apply.

2. The Contest Director may, at his option, participate in the racing.

3. All personnel must wear a hardhat to be on the course. This includes starters, pilots, timers, callers, & pylon judges. No one will be allowed on the course without a hardhat.

4. Everyone will be kept off the course at a safe distance, except the participants.

5. The pilot & caller's duties require caller to stay with & assist pilot from determination of takeoff order, to such time as the pilot is finished racing & his aircraft & equipment are completely removed from the field.

 At conclussion of the race, the contestants are to land as soon as possible in the same order as takeoff, unless otherwise directed by the starter.



DATE: SEPTEMBER 16TH STARTING TIME: 11am PLACE: STARS FIELD

#### GENERAL RULES

1. Entry fee will be \$3 for each class raced at each session.

2. All day fly-off scheduled for the final racing session will be treated separately for those wishing to compete just for that day. An additional \$3 entry fee will be charged. If you have flown in any of the previous sessions you must pay the fee as collected at the past 2 sessions. However, if you have not flown before, you may enter just the final session costing \$3. Flyers must participate in 1 of the races other than the final session to qualify for season trophys (1-3 places). Final session must be 1 of the 2 sessions for overall trophy.

 Flying will be in 2 classes - Class 1 and Class 3 combined, and the Sig Super Sport class.

4. Fuel will be provided, & will be 10% nitromethane. Each airplane will be emptied & refilled before flying.

5. All aircraft must be of sound structure and are subject to inspection by the racing committee. Aircraft determined not to be safe for competition or in compliance with the rules will be disgualified.

6. Restarts will be allowed, until such time as the lead aircraft has completed his third lap.

Picture Plaques will be awarded for the first two sessions, for 1st place in both classes.

Picture Plaques will be awarded for the Final Season Flyoff, for 1st place in both classes for the day only, and 1st through 3rd places in both classes for the season.

There will also be trophies for most improved time and personal best time.



And thus was model aviation born on the earth and continues to this very day.



A special congratulations should go out to Art Rose, Dave Sikorski, and Dan Williams for their untiring efforts in making this program successful. Last year a person could go to the STARS field on a beautiful Sunday afternoon and be fortunate to find one or two club members flying. On Wednesday

Sept. 5th it was drizzling, ceiling was 300', the parking lot was full, and Art Rose had a student flying. Lon test flew a new modelers Aerostar 40, while the student hyper-ventilated observing the loops and rolls required to properly trim his new plane. This is an example of the enthusiasm the STARS training program has generated in our club. Later in the season, the students who have solved will be presented their wings at a special time honoring their accomplishments.

A special operator will answer your call from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. EDT. The service is restricted to 1990 members who want to renew using either Visa or MasterCard charge cards. No other service is offered through this toll-free number and calls cannot be switched to other AMA departments.

Your charge account will not be billed with the cost of membership until after October 1, 1990. Your AMA license will be mailed to you early in October so you can be the first person at the field to have a 1991 license.

You will help AMA spread the renewal workload, thereby saving money for your national association. You will get your card early and there will be no cost to you until October 1990.

Remember—hours of operation will be from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. Eastern Daylight Time.

Months of the operation will be July, August, and September 1990.

Hold AMA costs down. Get your license early.
